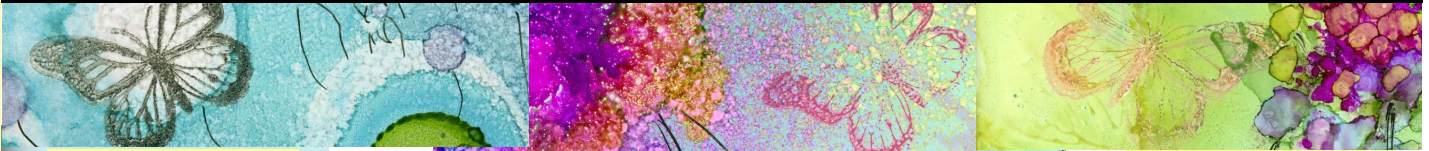

### Day in the Life: Smart Devices and Apps Rule

As we continue to analyze the results of the Day in the Life study of third-year medical students, there are several overall impressions.

All students interviewed carried smart phones and used them frequently (though rarely for voice calls).

Searching for information was embedded in their daily

life, both clinical and personal. The convenience of accessing information through a smart device was key to its usability.

Because wireless and cell networks frequently necessitate log-ins for subscribed (paid) resources, students turned to free products and apps. As one student noted:

"I always before I buy a book or anything like that, I look up and see if there's an app for it just so it'll be readily accessible for me and it's easier to use."

### George Washington and Medicine

"*Every Necessary Care and Attention: George Washington and Medicine*" is available for viewing through April 25 in the Medical Library.

Developed and produced by the National Library of Medicine and the Mount Vernon Estate and Gardens, this traveling exhibit highlights medical care in the colonial era.

An accompanying exhibit from the Library's Special Collections features books owned by the SIU Medical

Library that are also part of the NLM's History of Medicine collection.

Especially note the extended title of the **Handbook for the Military Surgeon** (1861), which details the broad responsibilities of the battlefield surgeon (e.g., setting up sanitation, preparation of food, and requisitioning of supplies).

**Domestic Medicine** (1798) is an example of the kind of sources available to doctors, surgeons, and healers in that

era.

**On Baths and Mineral Waters** (1831) includes "a full account of the hygienic and curative powers of cold, tepid, warm, hot and vapour baths, and of sea bathing."

The presence of many of these historical materials in the Medical Library is due to early community support of the School of Medicine and the Medical Library through special purchases and donations of gifts.

On March 26th, several students from the School of Medicine collaborated with the Medical Resource Center to set-up an exhibit at the Marion High School Library. The information provided by the medical students was

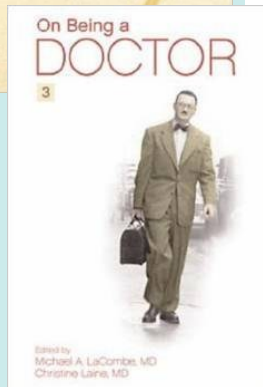
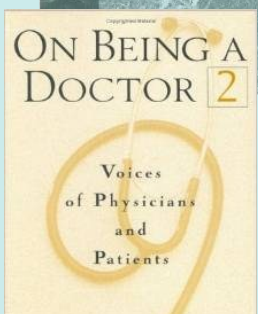
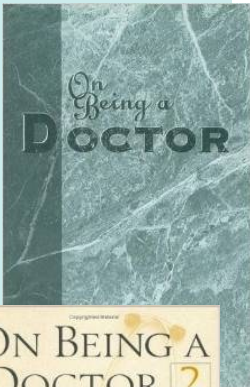

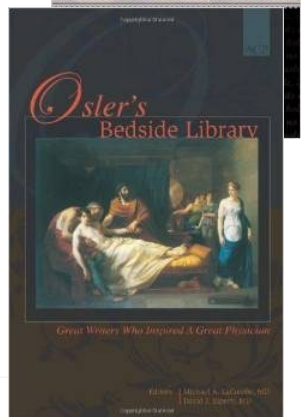

## Highlighted Resources: App Recap

Results from the “Day in the Life” study of third year medical students revealed a preference for using smart phone apps to find quick answers to clinical questions.

Therefore, we present a recap of apps available for some of our licensed resources as well as a few free apps.

### SIUSM Licensed Apps

#### Clinical Pharmacology Mobile App

Apple and Android. Content available through the app includes:

- Drug monographs, both adult and pediatric
- Indications, including on and off label
- Contraindications and precautions
- Drug images
- IV compatibility
- Drug - drug interactions report

#### DynaMed App

Apple and Android. DynaMed, a clinical reference tool, provides evidence-based information for physicians and other health care providers. The app can be used offline without a wireless signal.

#### EbscoHost Mobile App

Apple and Android. The EbscoHost Research Databases include MEDLINE Complete and Academic Search Complete. Both databases include the full text of some of the articles.

#### First Consult App

Apple. The app allows *First Consult's* content to be stored on your iPhone, iPad, or iPod touch. A data connection is required for the initial content download and content updates, but is not required to use the app itself. *First Consult* is part of Elsevier's *ClinicalKey*.

#### JoVE App

Apple and Android. *JoVE, the Journal of Visualized Experiments*, is a scientific video journal.

### Free Apps

#### PubMed for Handhelds

Apple iOS app features multiple ways to search PubMed/MEDLINE: PICO (Patient, Intervention, Comparison, Outcome); ask-MEDLINE, a free-text, natural language search; Consensus Abstracts; and BabelMeSH which has search options in 13 languages.

#### Shots by STFM

Apple and Android. Shots is a quick reference guide to the Childhood Immunization Schedule from the Society of Teachers of Family Medicine. Updated yearly.

#### LactMed

Apple and Android. Information about maternal and infant drug levels, possible effects on lactation and on breastfed infants, and alternative drugs to consider.
