Please see the description below for Executive Associate Dean, which describes the SIU School of Medicine and the 3 years of work leading to the Dean position. In addition to the job duties described for the Executive Associate Dean and CEO SIU HealthCare, the position of Dean and Provost adds oversight of the chairs and departments of Basic Sciences, Research and Faculty Development, Education and Curriculum, Graduate Medical Education, Foundation and Development, Continuing Medical Education, Alumni Affairs, Institutional Planning, Diversity and Integration, Public Affairs, Library, Legal Affairs, Community Health and Service, External Affiliations, and Governmental Affairs. The position of Executive Associate Dean was not be replaced and Dr. Kruse assumed the duties of both.

Dr. Kruse has continued the strategic work that was started as Executive Associate Dean on Jan. 1, 2013 (paragraph below). Over 5 years, Dr. Kruse has developed a new leadership team (new CFO/COO for both SIU School of Medicine and SIU HealthCare, new CMO, new Executive Director of Information Technology for both organizations, new Asst. Provost for Clinical and External Affiliations, new Executive Director for Telehealth and Clinical Outreach, 5 new clinical chairs among 8 total, new Associate Dean for Research, new Associate Dean for Human and Organizational Potential, new Executive Director for Marketing and Communication and new educational initiatives (new Department of Population Science and Policy, new Department of Emergency Medicine, new Office of Population Health, completely revamped Year 3 Clerkship, new Center for Human and Organizational Potential).

The excellence in education has been recognized by the Liaison Committee on Medical Education, which gave the SIU School of Medicine full 8 year accreditations in 2007 and 2015, both times with no citations, the only occasion in the history of U.S. medical schools that consecutive full accreditations with no citations has occurred. In 2019, the SIU SOM became the only medical school in the world to hold five life-time achievement *Aspire to Excellence Awards* from the Association of Medical Education in Europe (see below). The joint Memorial Medical Center/SIU School of Medicine educational and quality improvement partnerships described below have led to significant national recognition – the SIU School of Medicine has been chosen by national public broadcasting *Behind the Scenes* series (narrated by James Earl Jones) as the single medical school to spotlight for educational innovation in 2016, Memorial Medical Center was chosen as the single U.S. hospital for the top American Hospital Association award, the *AHA-McKesson Quest for Quality Prize* 2016, and MMC/SIU quality initiatives were featured in the 2015 *Best in America* series on Fox Business Channel television.

Under Dr. Kruse’s leadership as both Chair of Family & Community Medicine and in the Office of the Dean, the SIU School of Medicine has been a national leader in the development of NCQA certified Patient-Centered Medical Homes and the implementation of a wide-spread network of Federally Qualified Health Centers administered jointly by the School, the Department and community boards. The SIU SOM FQHC system is the largest such system in the United States, now with 13 functioning sites in which all faculty members, administrators and staff are employed by the SIU School of Medicine. SIU SOM is an early adopter of the hot-spotting philosophy, and was selected by the Camden Coalition as one of four health professions schools (Thomas Jefferson University, University of Utah and Samuel Merritt University) to lead the training effort in hot-spotting for other health professions schools. This work, together with other initiatives to evaluate and improve the health of populations, led to two major national awards: The 2018 Josiah Macy, Jr. Foundation Award for Excellence in Social Mission for Healthcare Educational Institutions and one of the American Hospital Association NOVA Awards for collaboration of institutions to improve community health (awarded to partners SIU SOM, Memorial Medical Center and HSHS St. John’s Hospital in Springfield, Illinois)

Dr. Kruse was responsible for the design, approval and implementation of the SIU School of Medicine Strategic Plan which was implemented in December 2013 and ran through December 2018. Major results of that plan for the 7 strategic priorities are:

1. Physician Workforce Development
 - a. A new program, Lincoln Scholars, has been approved and will add 8 medical students per year beginning in August 2020. All 4 years of training will occur in the southernmost area of the state surrounding Carbondale.
 - b. New residency positions and three new fellowships (Cardiology, Hematology-Oncology and Critical Care Medicine) were added, increasing the number of residents and fellows from 330 to 380.
 - c. Indicators of training a balanced and diverse workforce are excellent. The 2018 AAMC Mission Management Tool ranks the SIU SOM ranks at 95th percentile among US medical schools for percentage of graduates who plan careers in primary care and 94th percentile for percentage of graduates who are African American or Black.
2. Education
 - a. A dramatic change in education for clinical decision making, Core Clinical Competencies, and a unique design for the Year 3 Clerkship (eight 4 week clerkships and a 15 week Personalized Educational Experience) have received international acclaim.
 - b. The SIU SOM is now the only medical school in the world with 5 lifetime achievement *Aspire to Excellence Awards* from the Association of Medical Educators of Europe,

- adding awards for Medical Simulation (2018) and Curriculum Innovation (2019) to the previous awards of Student Engagement, Student Assessment and Social Accountability.
- c. The SIU SOM was awarded the Josiah Macy, Jr., Foundation Award for Excellence in Social Mission for US health professions education institutions (2018 – one award given)
3. Research, Scholarship and Innovation
 - a. The basic science departments were restructured to improve efficiency, visibility, and competitiveness for external funding. A new Associate Dean for Research, Chief Science Officer and two new basic science department chairs were named.
 - b. Translational Research is fully functional with the restructuring of the basic science departments, the growth of the Center for Clinical Research, and the founding of the new Department of Population Science and Policy.
 - c. Implemented the Boyer Model of Scholarship for performance assessment – Scholarship of Discovery, Integration, Application and Education
 4. Clinical Practice and Health of the Population
 - a. High performance in quality indicators – Developed high functioning clinically integrated network, including Physician Health Association of Illinois (top 5 in quality of 110 Illinois physician groups) and HSHS Primary Care Integration Network.
 - b. Maintained firm financial status while successfully overcoming the State of Illinois budget impasse.
 - c. Established one of the largest clinical and educational networks of Federally Qualified Health Centers fully owned and operated by a University – the SIU Centers for Family Medicine. 13 sites, over 250,000 patient encounters annually, large MAT-ODD network, 84 resident physicians.
 5. Professional and Community Engagement
 - a. Hotspotting Camden Initiative – see narrative above
 - b. Whole Neighborhood Care and Community Health Worker Training. With Memorial Medical Center and St. John’s Hospital, won the American Hospital Association NOVA Award in 2018 for the Enos Park Care Collaborative. This project led to the development of an extensive neighborhood care network and formal training for community health workers.
 6. Professional and Leadership Development
 - a. Established a new Office for Human and Organizational Potential, led by an associate dean which developed the Center for Human and Organizational Potential (cHOP) with major initiatives in Wellness, Leadership and Excellence, and Professional Development.
 - b. Elevated equity and diversity work to the associate dean level, with emphasis on equity (justice, fairness) and becoming an anti-racist organization.
 7. Brand and Image
 - a. New color, logo, tagline and designation implemented (2017)
 - b. New positions – Office of Regional Affairs, Office of Associate Dean for External Relations, Office of Marketing and Communications
 - c. Many new facilities – Simulation Center, Administrative Building, Women and Children’s Center, Center for Family Medicine (2 buildings), Bond building for ENT, Physician Assistant Educational building

A new strategic plan was developed and approved in 2019, and implementation began in 2020.

Dr. Kruse is currently leading the School through the COVID-19 pandemic. Major new initiatives and partnerships with the state of Illinois have developed. A formal training program for Community Health Workers has been established, and for the pandemic, their training has been beneficial for their transformation to Pandemic Health Workers. Telemedicine has flourished, and the clinical practice has

grown significantly during the pandemic. Educational and research has continued with a new reliance on virtual techniques. The students have fared well on standardized and licensing examinations.

Executive Associate Dean - SIU School of Medicine (Jan. 1, 2013 – Dec. 31, 2015)
CEO SIU HealthCare - (March 1, 2013 - present)

The SIU School of Medicine is a community-based medical school with a regional mission based on social accountability to the 66 counties and 2.2 million people it serves. Founded in 1969, the SIU-SOM is an international leader in educational innovation. SIU HealthCare was founded in 1997 and is the 260 physician multi-specialty group practice of the SIU-SOM. In these two positions of institutional leadership, Dr. Kruse was charged to develop and implement a unified vision and strategy for the SIU-SOM and SIU HealthCare, and to build the internal and external relationships necessary for the healthcare education, practice, research and community engagement of the future. The Executive Associate Dean position was newly created in 2013, and when combined with the CEO position, was described in this way by the Office of the Dean: "This creates the structure needed to facilitate current academic and clinical business needs, such as negotiating new partnerships and collaboration opportunities that cross traditional clinical and academic lines. The scope and authority of this role is necessary as we move into an era of rapidly changing local, regional, and national healthcare environments." Among others, the clinical chairs, the Associate Provost for Finance and Administration (the SOM's CFO/COO position), Human Resources, the Chief Information Officer of SIU-SOM and SIU HealthCare, and all of the leadership team of SIU HealthCare (COO, CFO, CMO, CIO) report directly to Dr. Kruse.

In the first two years of Dr. Kruse's leadership, a strategic plan was formulated, the new leadership team for the School of Medicine and SIU HealthCare was established; 4 new clinical chairs were named (of a total of 8); a population health science program was established; the Midwest Healthcare Quality Alliance and the Quality Alliance Patient Safety Organization were established (both joint LLCs with Memorial Health System); the ability of the system to confer Part IV Maintenance of Certification credit was granted by the ABMS; system-wide unification of the finance, the IT, IR and IS functions occurred; telemedicine, teleconferencing and clinical outreach were united; the IT infrastructure and Security functions were revamped and centralized; planning for 6 new buildings (1 educational, 1 administration and 4 clinical) totaling over 300,000 square feet was begun and progressed significantly; a neurosciences institute was established; a new electronic medical record for the practice was instituted; and a new compensation plan for faculty approved by the Board of Directors. Management of change became a central function of the office.

SIU School of Medicine Department of Family & Community Medicine, Chair (1998-2013)
SIU School of Medicine Department of Family & Community Medicine, Interim Chair (1997)

At the time Dr. Kruse was chair, the Department of Family & Community Medicine consisted of four family medicine residency training programs (in Carbondale, Decatur, Quincy and Springfield) and a central core office that served a predominantly rural population of over 2,200,000 people in a 66 county, 30,000 square mile area of Central, Western and Southern Illinois. The faculty consisted of 38 full time family physicians and 19 non-physicians (experimental and counseling psychologists, social workers, physician assistants, nurse practitioners, midwives, and pharmacists), and 84 resident physicians and fellows in training. These professionals provided 150,000 patient visits annually in six family medicine centers, four of which are Rural Health Clinics in federally designated health professional shortage areas, and all of which are NCQA designated Patient-Centered Medical Homes. The Department's first Federally Qualified Health Center was opened in October 2012, and provided the impetus for the development of the largest academic FQHC system in the United States. The central office housed the Division of Medical Student Education, which coordinated the department's teaching effort for 288 SIU medical students. For six consecutive years, the Family & Community Medicine Clerkship for third

year students was the highest rated clerkship at SIU. The central office also housed the offices of Research and Program Development, Finance & Administration, Osteopathic Medicine, Information Technology and Data Management, and Quality Initiatives.

The Department is known for its excellence in rural medicine education, rural health care delivery and health policy. The Department is a leader in developing collaborative relationships with institutions of osteopathic medicine and other healthcare professionals. Three of the residency programs are dually accredited by the Accreditation Council on Graduate Medical Education and the American Osteopathic Association. The Department has established two fellowships in Primary Care Musculoskeletal Medicine (Sports Medicine), and one family medicine hospitalist fellowship, and provides antenatal care and delivery for over 900 women each year in its clinical offices and rural health clinics. The Department emphasizes scholarly pursuit in Clinical Translational Science, Population Health & Preventive Medicine, Maternal and Child Health, and Musculoskeletal Medicine.

Quincy Family Medicine Programs, Executive Director (2003-2012)

Quincy Family Practice Residency Program, Program Director (1991-2003), Assistant Program Director (1984-1991)

At the time Dr. Kruse was the Program Director, the Quincy Family Medicine Residency Training Program had 18 resident physicians, ten full time physician faculty members and six non-physician faculty members. The Program emphasized training that gives the resident physician the skills and tempered independence necessary to practice in rural areas. The training in emergency medicine, musculoskeletal medicine and community-oriented primary care was particularly strong. The Quincy Sports Medicine Fellowship Training Program (Primary Care Musculoskeletal 4th year Residency) was accredited in 2002, has one fellow per year, and three faculty members with Certificates of Added Qualifications in Sports Medicine. In addition, the SIU Office for Rural Education and Research was established in 1998, and is noted for scholarly and educational work in Community Oriented Primary Care, interprofessional collaboration, and the development of interprofessional systems of care in rural medically underserved areas. The program's Patient Centered Medical Home now houses comprehensive mental health services under the same roof, a model for which it has received national recognition.

Chair, SIU School of Medicine Educational Policy Council (2000-2011)

The SIU School of Medicine instituted a major curricular change in 2000 (Curriculum 2000). In 2000, Dr. Kruse was elected by faculty representatives to head the curriculum committee for the School, the Educational Policy Council (EPC). The EPC reports directly to the Dean and Provost of the School of Medicine and is responsible for oversight of the curriculum and all major educational policies. Dr. Kruse guided the institution of Curriculum 2000, and was re-elected three times by faculty representatives to head the Council. The SIU School of Medicine is known as an international leader in medical school curriculum innovation, and in 2007 received full accreditation from the Liaison Council on Medical Education (LCME) with no citations and five commendations for its curriculum, a level of accreditation excellence not achieved by any other US medical school.

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Jerry Kruse, MD, MSPH, is Dean and Provost of the Southern Illinois University School of Medicine and CEO of SIU Medicine, the faculty practice plan of the SIU School of Medicine. He is a tenured professor of Family & Community Medicine and of Medical Education.

Dr. Kruse joined the SIU School of Medicine faculty in 1984 and has served the organization in many leadership roles. He was Chair of the Dept. of Family & Community Medicine (16 years), Director of the Quincy Family Medicine Residency Program (12 years), and Director of Quincy Family Medicine's Complex Office Laboratory (37 years). He was Chair of the SIU School of Medicine curriculum committee, the Educational Policy Council (11 years), and served on the Tenure and Promotion Committee (4 years).

He is a national advocate for innovation in medical education and the advancement of health systems.
